Union was not only to advance the evangelical program. It would be a visible expression of a common experience of conversion that had already given evangelicals a sense of spiritual unity. It would be a necessary means to the achievement of the vision, not only by consolidating evangelical effort but also, and perhaps even more crucially, by removing the scandal of division that was considered to be one of the chief obstacles preventing the world from recognizing the truth of Christianity; unionists like to quote Jesus' prayer in John 17:21, "that they may all be one . . . so that the world may believe." Union would also be something even beyond a means. It would be a foretaste of the glorious day when God would "unite all things in (Christ), things in haven and things on earth" (Eph 1:10). A federation of churches was the favoured form of union/unity in the United States, and many Canadian Presbyterians urged it as an alternative to union. Unionists dismissed it as failing to meet the needs of many small and scattered Canadian communities that found it difficult to support even one church.

Union was to reflect the spirit of the age, fulfilling human aspirations as much as biblical prophesies. It was to embody the rising social gospel that understood the Kingdom of God not merely as the transformation of society through the conversion of individuals but as the inauguration of a new political and economic order. Above all, many unionists urged, the United Church should be rid of the shackles for emerging problems. Union was to represent not merely the fulfillment of an old dream but the birth of new possibilities.

Despite the openness toward the future, the founders were by no means indifferent to the heritage of the past. Each of the constituent denominations brought to the United Church distinctive elements it regarded as of fundamental importance.
